Methodist Covenant Service

From the earliest days of the Methodist societies, John Wesley invited the Methodist people to renew their Covenant relationship with God. The emphasis of the service is on God's readiness to enfold us in generous love, not dependent on our deserving. Our response, also in love, springs from our thankful recognition of God's grace. The Covenant is not just a one-to-one transaction between individuals and God, but the act of the whole faith community.

Reflection

The annual Covenant Service is at the heart of our discipleship as Christians within the Methodist tradition. It is in this service that the whole Church, the Connexion of Methodists worldwide and the Connexion here in Britain joyfully celebrates God's

gracious offer to Israel as in the reading from Deuteronomy that "I will be their God and they shall be my people".

We believe that the offer made to Israel extends to all women and men in Jesus Christ. Jesus provides us with the supreme example of what it is to live in such a close and committed relationship with God both individually and corporately. What God offers us is a loving relationship. The Covenant is not a contract in which God and human beings agree to provide goods and services for each other! It is not something that we have to do to create a relationship with God. God's grace comes first. The Covenant is the means by which we accept the relationship and then seek to sustain it. It is not about acquiring a relationship with God but about continuing to live within the loving relationship that God has already made possible.

There is a challenge however within the Covenant offer. If God is committed to us, are we prepared to accept that as reality and commit ourselves in return to God? If we are, then how are we to live out this relationship faithfully as individuals and as a local Methodist church, an offshoot of the larger Circuit to which we belong?

One of the ancient analogies by which the prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel) referred to the people of Israel was that they were God's vineyard. John plucks this image and uses it here to illustrate the Oneness, the unity of God. God is the vinedresser enabling the flowing of the divine life through the vine, pruning it so it can grow and bear more and more fruit. 'Think of me', Jesus says, 'as that vine through whom the essence of the One God flows into every branch and through whom all the nations on earth will be blessed'. Think of yourselves as the branches of the vine and see how we are all bound together in this divine purpose. God flows through me and I flow through you. Your job as the branches is to remain attached so the flow will be unbroken. Only by remaining attached can you grow and bear fruit. A branch that is cut off will wither and die. God, the vinedresser, continually cares for, nurtures, and prunes the vine cutting back the branches to maximise their growth and their yield of fruit.

So, sisters and brothers as we commence a New Year 2023 and as we make once again our Covenant oath, how are we to ensure that we each of us both personally and corporately stay attached to the vine?

John Wesley referred to some of the ways in which we are able to do this in his sermon on 'the means of grace'. He said we must pray regularly and we must study the Scriptures. These are things we can all do at home to ensure the flow from the vine to the branches is maintained. It will demand commitment and discipline and a willingness to allow ourselves to be pruned, but over time if we stick at it, we will bear much fruit.

The Covenant

God made a covenant with the people of Israel, calling them to be a holy nation, chosen to bear witness to his steadfast love by finding delight in the law. The covenant was renewed in Jesus Christ our Lord, in his life, work, death, and resurrection. In him all people may be set free from sin and its power, and united in love and obedience. In this covenant God promises us new life in Christ. For our part we promise to live no longer for ourselves but for God. We meet, therefore, as generations have met before us, to renew the covenant which bound them and binds us to God. Let us then seek forgiveness for the sin by which we have denied God's claim upon us.

Let us pray

God of mercy, hear us as we confess our sins.

For the sin that has made us slow to learn from Christ, reluctant to follow him, and afraid to bear the cross:

Lord, have mercy,

Lord, forgive

For the sin that has caused the poverty of our worship,

the formality and selfishness of our prayers, our neglect of fellowship and the means of grace, and our hesitating witness for Christ:

Lord, have mercy, Lord, forgive.

For the sin that has led us to misuse your gifts, evade our responsibilities, and fail to be good stewards of your creation:

Lord, have mercy, Lord, forgive.

For the sin that has made us unwilling to overcome evil with good, tolerant of injustice, quick to condemn, and selfish in sharing your love with others:

Lord, have mercy, Lord, forgive.

Silence

Have mercy on me, O God, in your constant love. in the fullness of your mercy blot out my offences. Wash away all my guilt, and cleanse me from my sin. Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Give me the joy of your help again and strengthen me with a willing spirit.

If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins, and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Therefore, to all who truly repent this is his gracious word: 'Your sins are forgiven.'

Amen. Thanks be to God.

Sisters and brothers in Christ,
let us again accept our place within this covenant
which God has made with us and with all who are
called to be Christ's disciples.
This means that, by the help of the Holy Spirit,
we accept God's purpose for us,
and the call to love and serve God
in all our life and work.

Christ has many services to be done: some are easy, others are difficult. some bring honour, others bring reproach. some are suitable to our natural inclinations and material interests, others are contrary to both. in some we may please Christ and please ourselves. in others we cannot please Christ except by denying ourselves.

Yet the power to do all these things is given to us in Christ, who strengthens us.

Therefore, let us make this covenant of God our own. Let us give ourselves to him, trusting in his promises and relying on his grace.

Eternal God,

in your faithful and enduring love you call us to share in your gracious covenant in Jesus Christ. In obedience we hear and accept your commands. in love we seek to do your perfect will. with joy we offer ourselves anew to you. We are no longer our own but yours.

I am no longer my own but yours. Your will, not mine, be done in all things, wherever you may place me, in all that I do and in all that I may endure. when there is work for me and when there is none. when I am troubled and when I am at peace. Your will be done when I am valued and when I am disregarded. when I find fulfilment and when it is lacking. when I have all things, and when I have nothing. I willingly offer all I have and am to serve you, as and where you choose. Glorious and blessèd God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. May it be so forever. Let this covenant now made on earth be fulfilled in heaven. Amen.

As we have entered this covenant not for ourselves alone, but as God's servants and witnesses, let us pray for the church and for the world.

Loving God, hear us as we pray for your holy catholic church:

make us all one, that the world may believe.

Inspire and lead all who govern and hold authority in the nations of the world:

establish justice and peace among all people.

Have compassion on all who suffer from any sickness, grief or trouble:

deliver them from their distress.

We praise you for all your saints who have entered your eternal glory:

bring us all to share in your heavenly kingdom.

Let us pray in silence for our own needs and for those of others...
