Intercessory Prayers

Spend some time quietly praying for people or concerns that are close to you at this time - and for particular concerns in the news today.

For those who look after our health, For those who look after our safety, For those who teach and train, For those who give advice and support.

For those who provide the essentials for life. Lord we pray that these people may find satisfaction and joy in their work, and may serve those they seek to help with patience, courage and understanding.

Lord we pray for those whose work is not rewarded by a wage.

For voluntary workers in areas of need For parents and carers,
For those who fundraise for charity
For those who serve as community leaders
Lord we pray that society may value these people and give them the support that they need. We pray that they may fulfil their duties with humility and generosity of spirit.

Let us pray for those who are unable to go about their daily lives and work.

For those who are unemployed, For those who are ill, For those who have been injured, For those recently bereaved

Sermon

In this section of Matthew's gospel, Jesus is calling the Israel of his day to be Israel indeed now that he is there. What he says can be applied to all Christians. God called Israel to be the salt of the earth, but Israel was behaving like everyone else with power politics, factional squabbling, militant revolutions. How could God keep the world from going bad (the main function of salt in the ancient world), if Israel, his chosen 'salt' has lost its distinctive taste?

The gospel passage begins with "you are the salt of the earth". It is a phrase deeply rooted in our understanding. We are each privileged to know people about whom this phrase rings true. They are good worthy, unassuming people who quietly go about their daily lives living for others in a way that is self-sacrificial. As I thought about this link between salt and the Christian, random connections came into my mind. Three have more substance and I will develop those later but I thought I would share the others — you might find one of them helpful —

Salt is salt because it is different -

When asked "What does salt taste like?" the only answer is "it tastes like salt". It is unique. The influence of a Christian should be a unique force in the world.

Salt needs to be scattered -

In fact it is usually distasteful any other way. If left in the salt shaker it absorbs damp and soon hardens. It is best when spread. We need to show in our lives what Christ has done for us. We need to be used.

Salt is composed of many different sized grains

When viewed through a microscope, salt grains are different sizes and shapes. Christians are this way too. All Christians of all ages make up the salt of the earth.

Salt never calls attention to itself except when it is in the wrong place -.

When sprinkled on food it brings out the natural flavour. One is hardly aware of its presence. But don't sprinkle it on ice cream! If the Christian compromises with the world's ways, we can soon find that we are in the wrong place.

There are, however, three special qualities of salt which deserve more attention. In the ancient world salt was a highly valued commodity and was in people's minds in these ways.

1 Purity

No doubt its glistening whiteness made the connection easy. The Romans said that salt was the purest of all things because it came from the purest of all things — the sea and the sun. Salt was the most primitive of all offerings to the gods and Jewish offerings were offered with salt. So then if a Christian is to be the salt of the earth, he must be an example of purity. One of

the characteristics of the world today is, I believe, a lowering of standards. Honesty, conscientiousness, standards of diligence at work and moral standards are all lower. This is, of course, a generalisation and many exceptions are found. A Christian needs to be a person who holds aloft high standards of purity in speech, conduct and thought.

2 Preservative

In the ancient world salt was the commonest of all preservatives. It was used to stop things going bad. That was the rule until the advent of modern refrigeration. For centuries sailors have kept large quantities of salt on board to preserve the food that they took for their long voyages. So if salt preserves from corruption and the Christian is to be the salt of the earth, he must have a certain antiseptic influence on life. We all know that there are certain people in whose company it is easy to be good and that there are certain people in whose company it is easier to relax your standards. The Christian needs to be someone who, by their presence, makes it easier for others to be good.

3 Flavour

Salt brings out the flavour of things. I do not sprinkle salt over any of my food except a boiled egg - which is not the same without the salt! My wife, when she was about 7, lived in Solihull in one of a row of modest 3 bed semis. A few doors along lived Frank Smith who owned a couple of fields where he grew potatoes. He branched out with a new business by slicing potatoes very thinly, frying them to become crisp and brown. Then he sold them in packets for a snack. The new idea had quite a low take up. Then he tucked a little pinch of salt wrapped in blue paper into each packet. (Older readers will no doubt remember them). His business boomed so that he had to purchase much more farm land to grow his potatoes. In Great Britain alone many millions of packets of crisps (originally just Smith's Crisps) are sold every week and the business spread overseas. Now (with a different company) it provides Gary Lineker with a good income!!). Food without salt is often insipid. Christianity is to life what salt is to food. It lends flavour. The tragedy is that so often people have connected

Christianity with the exact opposite — that it takes the flavour out of life. The US poet and academic Oliver Wendell Holmes once said "I might have entered the ministry if certain clergymen that I knew had not looked and acted so much like undertakers". Robert Louis Stevenson once entered in his diary, as if recording an extraordinary phenomenon, "I have been to church today and am not depressed!"

We need to discover the lost radiance of the Christian faith. In a worried world, the Christian should be the one who can remain serene. In a depressed world the Christian should be the one who retains the joy of life. There should be a sparkle about us. Wherever we are, we must be diffusers of joy.

The sting in the tail!!

Jesus went on to say that if the salt had become insipid, it was fit only to be thrown out and trodden on by men. This is a difficult passage because salt does not normally lose its flavour and its saltiness. We do have a clue as to what he meant, however. In Palestine the ordinary oven was frequently out of doors. It is built of stone on a base of tiles. In such ovens, in order to retain the heat, a thick bed of salt is laid under the tile floor. After a certain length of time the salt perishes. The tiles are taken up, the salt removed and thrown on the road outside the door of the oven. It has lost its power to heat the tiles and is thrown out. It is then walked on by people passing by. That may well be the picture here. But the essential point remains, whatever the picture, and it is a point which the New Testament makes again and again, uselessness invites disaster. If a Christian is not fulfilling his purpose as a Christian then he is on the way to disaster. We are meant to be the salt of the earth and if we do not bring to life the purity, the antiseptic power and the radiance that we ought, then we invite disaster.

We may ask where are the ancient Christian churches of Asia Minor, of Antioch, of Constantinople and of Alexandria? They are trodden underfoot! Over the entrance of a Damascan mosque, you can read the faint and half obliterated inscription "The Kingdom of Christ is an everlasting kingdom!" But above these faded words, there is an inscription in

bold letters - There is no god but Allah and Mohammed is his prophet.

The salt has lost its savour!!
