Bible Readings

Isaiah 41 verses 17-20 'The Helper of Israel'

The poor and needy search for water, but there is none; their tongues are parched with thirst. But I the Lord will answer them; I, the God of Israel, will not forsake them.

I will make rivers flow on barren heights, and springs within the valleys. I will turn the desert into pools of water, and the parched ground into springs.

I will put in the desert the cedar and the acacia, the myrtle and the olive. I will set junipers in the wasteland, the fir and the cypress together, so that people may see and know, may consider and understand, that the hand of the Lord has done this, that the Holy One of Israel has created it.

Luke 21 verses 1-4, 'The widow's offering'
As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. "Truly I tell you," he said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."

Reflection

Last weekend, the focus in the Christian churches, and the nation, was rightly on the Royal Family and the Coronation of King Charles III. A family who represent the epitome of extreme wealth, privilege and status. (A factual statement, not to be viewed as a criticism.) Now, this week, the thoughts of the Christian churches turn to those people at the other end of the wealth, privilege and status spectrum, who are reliant on Christian Aid for help, even their very existence.

The Old Testament is very strong on our responsibility to see and respond to poverty around us. For those in Old Testament times, that meant those in their own community, whereas for us we are able to see the needs on doorsteps thousands of miles away too, and to do something to help people both at home and abroad.

In our reading from Isaiah chapter 41 verses 17-20, we are reminded that the poor and needy search for water, but there is none. This is the plight of so many as rains fail, as they face drought due to war or other human activity, or governments, businesses or other agencies acting for other motives than the best interest of the ordinary people in that location.

We are given a vision of God answering the calls for help of the poor and needy, with rivers flowing and springs of water bubbling up, enabling growth of the trees for shelter and food. In the desert, God will provide water and that will produce plant life which will enable human and animal life to be supported.

God says that he will provide, but we know that he needs us to respond and work through agencies like Christian Aid to enable this prophecy to come true today.

In the New Testament lesson, we read the well known story of the widow's offering. For us today, the message is that our small amounts add up to a greater whole, enabling those who receive the offering to do more good than we are able to achieve on our own.

What I put in an offering envelope will be multiplied greatly by other envelopes across my town, my county, my country.

What charities such as Christian Aid can do with those resources are multiplied when governments add to their appeals or support their work through overseas aid from richer countries to poorer, and give a sensible proportion of the country's wealth to achieve that aim. Most of all, we are reminded that, if they have the will to do so, governments have the resources to do in a day what it takes charities like Christian Aid a year to do, and which we could not achieve in our whole lifetime on our own. That is also a reminder of our responsibility, not just with our own financial resources but also with our votes and lobbying in support of the campaigns which Christian Aid encourage us to support.

Christian Aid Week offers us a moment to come together. To give what we can, Like the widow, knowing that it will be used wisely and will grow through other people responding in the same way. So that, through our giving and the work of Christian Aid, the vision of God enabling the water to flow in the desert regions will come to pass in many places in the world.

Whatever action you and your church are taking this Christian Aid Week;

- whether it's running a local fundraising event that will inspire your community to become a part of our mission for justice for the poor,
- being a collector in your neighbourhood,
- showing those how the church can step out in love for the world,
- giving what you can afford in your time or money,
- supporting Christian Aid campaigns, for climate justice or other just causes
- all of these actions will have an immediate impact on the lives of our sisters and brothers. This Christian Aid Week, let's work together so that others can share a more just world.
