Reflection

You may have noticed that I missed out the last verse of today's usual reading from the Acts of the Apostles. Ordinarily the pericope finishes at v. 13 with the naysayers of the crowd retorting, 'They are filled with new wine.' The omission is deliberate because I want our encounter with this passage to end with the same question that it does: 'What does this mean?' What did it mean for the disciples and the crowds 2000 years ago, and what does it mean to us today?

For those who were looking on at the apostles, the sight must have been both terrifying and mind-blowing in equal measure. Did the apostles each speak one discernible human language, one Greek, another Latin, another Arabic and so on, or was it the language of heaven, something 'other worldly' that took the limits of language to a higher plane? Were the disciples all speaking at the same time, a kind of prophetic megamix, or did they speak one at a time, taking it in turns to utter the language the Spirit had bestowed upon them? Of course, we cannot know what the scene looked like, or sounded like, or felt like, however much we would like to. But that shouldn't stop us imagining the scene and immersing ourselves in a moment of such intense spiritual power.

Whatever the means, and however it took place, the Spirit's purpose was accomplished. The gathered crowds heard and, furthermore, they understood. We can conclude from this that the 'what' and 'how' of this spectacular event might be interesting to ponder, but the 'why' is what really matters. Rewinding to chapter 1 tells us that the apostles had returned to Jerusalem following the ascension to be baptised by the Spirit as Jesus had instructed. The apostles, as they were waiting on the Spirit, devoted themselves to prayer along with other believers in their company. Peter preaches to the believers telling them of the downfall of Judas and then goes on to elect Matthias as his replacement. Peter, quoting from Psalms, says to them, "Let another take his position of overseer." For the scholars among you, it's interesting to note that the Greek word Luke-Acts uses in 1.20 for overseer is 'episkopon' (lit. 'office') from which is derived *episcopal* and latterly *bishop*. So, a level of hierarchy in Christian communities was already starting to emerge when Luke-Acts wrote.

What all this tells us is that the 'why' was to ignite the fledgling Church into life. To take them from listening to speaking, from being students to being teachers, from being followers to being those who *were* followed, from recipients of the Word to the means by which the Word was communicated. But the most precious ingredient was still missing. They had the people, they had the leaders, and they had the skills, but they didn't yet have the Holy Spirit, as Jesus had promised them. So, the 'why' comes into full view. It was the Spirit who transformed a group of people into the Church of Christ.

As it was then, so it is now. If we want to become the fully activated, fully realised Church of Christ then we must be filled with the Holy Spirit. It's what changes us from being just another group of people, however special that group might be, into the set apart witnesses of God's Word in the world. Without the Spirit dwelling in us, and speaking through us, I would venture as far as saying that our identity as Church risks being called into question.

What then does being filled with the Spirit actually look like? To return to Luke-Acts original question in v.12, 'what does this mean?' Some of you (like me) when faced with this question are already sceptical about the phrase 'being filled with the Spirit'. I remember as a teenager going along to a variety of evangelism events where, after a (lengthy!) period of preaching, the evangelist would offer the audience a chance to come forward to be ministered to. It was at such meetings that I first heard about being 'slain' by the Spirit, the moment that, when prayed for, the recipient would collapse and pass out. I always found this term somewhat strange! Why would a Holy Spirit whose very nature is to fill, embolden, enable, and empower want to *slay* anything? I remember digging my heels in at such events and saying to myself, 'if the Spirit wants me on the floor there's nothing I can do to stop it. 'It' never happened. Maybe I'm just not holy enough ^(C).

After all, did the disciples, on that first day of Pentecost look slain? Anything but. Filled with the Spirit they were empowered to bear witness to God's deeds of power, not just to a few, but to all. So, being filled with the Spirit isn't something to be afraid of. Rather the Spirit's presence within us completes us and makes us whole. To allow this though, we need to give the Holy Spirit space to inhabit our thinking and our feeling. It's a natural human instinct to want to be in control, but the nature of the Spirit is to push against this, not in an overpowering way, but gently inviting us to reassess who we are and what we centre our lives on.

The apostles set themselves apart for a short while and devoted themselves to prayer. They were obedient to Christ and made space for the Holy Spirit to move within and through them. The result was the birthing of something new. May we, as did they on that first Pentecost, make space to invite the Holy Spirit into our lives and our churches. May we be bold in telling of the mighty deeds of God and the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Holy Spirit, we welcome you!
