Bible Readings,

The Lord calls Samuel, 1 Sam 3 v 1-10

The boy Samuel ministered before the Lord under Eli. In those days the word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions.

One night Eli, whose eyes were becoming so weak that he could barely see, was lying down in his usual place. The lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the house of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called Samuel.

Samuel answered, 'Here I am.' And he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.' But Eli said, 'I did not call; go back and lie down. 'So he went and lay down.

Again the Lord called, 'Samuel! 'And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.'

'My son, 'Eli said, 'I did not call; go back and lie down.'

Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord: the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him.

A third time the Lord called, 'Samuel! 'And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am; you called me.'

Then Eli realised that the Lord was calling the boy. So Eli told Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening. "So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

The Lord came and stood there, calling as at the other times, 'Samuel! Samuel!'

Then Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'

John 1 v43-51,

John's disciples follow Jesus

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples. When he saw Jesus passing by, he said, 'Look, the Lamb of God!'

When the two disciples heard him say this, they followed Jesus. Turning round, Jesus saw them following and asked,' What do you want?'

They said, 'Rabbi '(which means 'Teacher'), 'where are you staying?'

'Come,' he replied,' and you will see.'

So they went and saw where he was staying, and they spent that day with him. It was about four in the afternoon.

Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two who heard what John had said and who had followed Jesus. The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother Simon and tell him, 'We have found the Messiah '(that is, the

Christ). And he brought him to Jesus.

Jesus looked at him and said,' You are Simon son of John. You will be called

Cephas' (which, when translated, is Peter[a]).

[a] Cephas (Aramaic) and Peter (Greek) both mean rock.

Reflection

Reverend Angela Berners-Wilson delivered the Christmas Meditation - 'Hope For Heavenly Peace' - on Christmas Day 2023 on BBC Radio 4. If you want to listen, it is on BBC Sounds for the next week or so. Writing in the Christmas Radio Times, Angela recalls how in 1994 the ordination of female priests was a controversial issue in the Anglican Church. She was one of thirty two women at the first Ordination of Women in the Church of England. As they were ordained alphabetically, she writes that she was the first by about two seconds! In her retirement, Angela has taken on a new role as a spiritual tour guide and this Christmas she was away in Austria on the Eve of Christmas Eve, in Obendorf, the village where the much love carol, Silent Night, was first performed on Christmas Eve 1818. Angela writes, that she always believed that when God calls someone

to serve, it has nothing to do with their gender. She joined the movement for the ordination of women in 1978. When the legislation was finally passed, Angela felt it was a wonderful occasion, and that all the prayers really had been answered. Angela was also present in 2015 at York Minster in 2015 when Libby Lane was the first Anglican Bishop consecrated, as Bishop of Stockport.

What an outrage that people were denied for so many years from pursuing the calling in which God was directing them, due to irrelevant issues like their sex. To have actually heard the voice of God speaking to them and then to find that the prejudice of others prevented that.

Our lessons today are two stories of people being called clearly by God. The young Samuel heard the call but did not realise it was God calling him. Thank God for the wise old man Eli, who at the second time of asking realised that the voice that was talking to Samuel was the voice of God.

Thinking of this story, it reminds us we need to listen to be able to hear the voice of God, and we often need someone like Eli, a father or mother in the faith, to explain what it is and how we need to respond.

John the Baptist played a similar role in the lives of his disciples to the role that Eli played in the life of Samuel. John knew that he was only the forerunner, that he himself was not the messiah. So having called his disciples to follow and learn from him, John plays this wonderful role of directing his disciples away from following him, so that they can follow their true calling, as disciples of Jesus. A salutary and worthwhile reminder to us that whoever we receive the message from, and however much we respect or admire them, we should always remember that first and foremost we are disciples of Jesus.

Listen, read, pray or sing along

We sing the hymn about the calling of Samuel, 'Hushed was the evening hymn, the temple courts were dark,' (Hymns and Psalms 523) https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7fP7j8EfpsY Hushed was the evening hymn, the temple courts were dark; the lamp was burning dim before the sacred ark; when suddenly a voice divine rang through the silence of the shrine.

The old man, meek and mild, the priest of Israel, slept; his watch the temple child, the little Levite, kept; and what from Eli's sense was sealed the Lord to Hannah's son revealed.

O give me Samuel's ear, the open ear, O Lord, alive and quick to hear each whisper of thy word, like him to answer at thy call, and to obey thee first of all.

O give me Samuel's heart, a lowly heart, that waits where in thy house thou art, or watches at thy gates; by day and night, a heart that still moves at the breathing of thy will.

O give me Samuel's mind, a sweet unmurmuring faith, obedient and resigned to thee in life and death, that I may read with child like eyes truths that are hidden from the wise. *James Drummond Burns (1823-1864)*
