Methodist Homes Sunday - Befriending

Opening prayer

Dot and Grace's Story

Following the pandemic and the loss of her husband and sister, Dot confided in her family, who live further away, about feeling lonely. With support, Dot applied to MHA's telephone befriending service where she was later introduced to Grace.

Similar to Dot, the pandemic resonated with Grace and brought up memories of her own grandparents. Grace decided she wanted to spend some of her time volunteering, with the aim of finding a new friend and that is exactly what she found in Dot.

After being carefully matched by MHA's befriending team, a weekly half-hour telephone conversation soon turned into regular texts checking in on one another, as family members would, which is what the pair now refer to each other as.

Read Mark 4. 30-32

Reflection

I can remember as a child growing mustard and cress seed on blotting paper. It germinated easily and you could soon harvest it with scissors for an egg and cress sandwich. The mustard seed in today's Bible reading is a different variety. Black mustard (Brassica nigra) was grown widely in first century Palestine for the seeds as a spice and the leaves for eating. Jesus uses this familiar plant to illustrate how the Kingdom of Heaven can grow from small beginnings to a structure that can support community life. Black mustard has the tiniest of seeds which quickly grow into bushes big enough for birds to nest in. In our own lives, a small seed or germ of faith can grow to move mountains as it says in Matthew 17.20.

Dot and her befriender Grace grew so close to be like family through MHA's Befriending scheme. The aim of the Befriending service is to reduce social isolation and loneliness in older people, who can be particularly at risk. Loneliness is an issue for many people, especially those in later life who find themselves living alone; having someone to talk to can make a real difference. Befriending can help a person feel seen and heard. The Befriending team says 'When we introduce someone to a befriender we often hear it's just knowing that someone is thinking of them that makes such a difference. Dot and Grace's friendship grew from a weekly telephone call to more frequent messages and then meeting in person. The befriending relationship allows the older person a chance to give back; it's a mutual relationship in which each gives and receives support, advice, wisdom and fun. The act of kindness of giving time to another person to just listen, can bring great fruit to both parties.

You may think that befriending is something in which you would like to be involved. Maybe you are lonely and would like to be linked with someone who would be in touch regularly. Or maybe you feel you could be a befriender. Either way our local MHA Communities Centre at the United Church in Jewry Street would be pleased to hear from you and will put you in touch with the Befriending team.

The lesson for us all from the parable of the mustard seed is that everyone is welcome in God's kingdom, no matter how small or insignificant you feel, and together we can blossom and grow into a force for good, here, in God's world, wherever we are. Remember mustard seeds are tiny but sprout quickly when nurtured to soon become a fruitful field. We can each play our own small part, and together share God's love with those we meet.

Jonathan Nowell writes in a hymn 'We are people whose life comes from you, Jesus. We need to carry your will in our heart. We need your purpose as our inspiration. We need your courage; each day a new start. Help us to see your people's needs. Breathe into our words and deeds, and plant in us your grain of mustard seed.' *Singing the Faith 515 v3.*
