### Meditation "A Sick Woman"

I was sick, sick of body and sick of mind, sick of spirit – fed up with having my hopes raised anly to be dashed again, fed up with everything. I'd suffered for so long, my strength failing, my fears multiplying, and I was ready to give up, to say goodbye to it all, to curl up in some dark corner and let life slip away.

But then suddenly I saw him, just a few yards in front of me, the man they were talking about -Jesus of Nazareth. Prophet teacher, worker of miracles – and it took only a glance to convince me he was the answer to my prayers. Yes I was desperate, admittedly ready to believe anything, clutching at straws, but there was more to it than that for I could see that this man was unique. So I pushed my way through the crowds and I reached out to touch him, just the faintest of contacts and yet immediately I felt well again. But then I froze in horror. He stopped and turned around and looked at the crowd. Goodness knows how he'd felt my touch amongst all the others, and I realised what I had done - broken every commandment in the book by touching him in my condition. I waited for the rebuke but it never came, just the question "Who touched me?". There was no escape - I knew there was no deceiving this man. I blurted out the whole story pleading for forgiveness. I still feared the worst but, as I dared to look up into his eyes, he had a look of love and understanding which I will never forget. "Daughter your faith has made you well. Go in peace and be healed of your disease". It was true the disease had gone but there was more than that. I found new meaning, new hope and new purpose. I am whole now, whole in body, whole in mind and whole in spirit, ready for whatever life might bring, ready for anything!

## Sermon

Introduction

The Bible passage has two stories — one within another — a Markan 'sandwich'. He does it again in Ch 11 with the story about the fig tree. On this occasion the 'outer ' story is about Jairus, a local synagogue president, and particularly his 12 yr old daughter. The 'inner' story is about a much older woman, who for the same 12 years has suffered

severe menstrual bleeding. I am today concentrating on the 'inner' story

### The Story

As Jesus breaks off his journey to deal with the woman, many of the crowd, and especially Jairus, would have been irritated and frustrated. After all his daughter is dying. Jesus is on his way to a house where we already suspect that he will find a corpse. Thoughts of sorrow would mingle with the threat of impurity, since contact with a dead body is one of the chief sources of impurity in Jewish law. Here, on the other hand, is a woman who has chronic internal bleeding at menstruation, one of the other main causes of impurity. Jairus has asked Jesus to come to his house so that his daughter may be 'saved'. The woman says to herself 'If I can only touch his clothes, I shall be rescued'

"Your faith has saved you" says Jesus to the woman. "Don't be afraid only believe" he says to Jairus. Clearly Mark intends us to see the stories knocking sparks off each other.

Jairus' need is obvious and loudly proclaimed, but this woman's need is every bit as desperate to her, even though she is silent about it. To have a discharge of blood is to be unclean and causes exclusion from contact with others and the synagogue. She had tried the doctors, she had tried everything. She had spent all her money and things only got worse. She had no doubt tried some of the Talmud's 11 cures - some quite bizarre! In desperation she reaches out in silent embarrassment to Jesus. She could not go into the crowd and state openly her problem., so she tried touching Jesus in secret. In the time of Jesus every devout Jew wore an outer robe with 4 tassels on the corners. It was one of these tassels that the woman had touched – and she found herself cured! Many a person has come to Jesus as a last resort, when they were desperate. No person needs to be desperate when they come to Jesus. He will never send us empty away. In the words of the lovely old hymn

"When other helpers fail and comforts flee., Help of the helpless O abide with me"

This passage tells us something about 3 people

1. It tells us something about Jesus

It tells of the cost of healing – it took something out of him. This is a universal rule of life. We will

never produce something great unless we are prepared to put something of ourselves into it. No pianist will ever give a really great performance just my following the notes with faultless technique. No actor will give a really great performance just repeating the words and gestures like a robot. His tears must be real tears, his feelings real feelings. No preacher who ever preached an inspired sermon will leave the pulpit without a feeling of being a bit drained.

Jesus had just had a most exacting time dealing with a violent man among the graves. He was now on a journey to visit a very sick child, and now this energy has gone out of him. It is the way of God to give and give and give again

2. <u>It tells us something about the disciples</u>
<u>It shows the limitations of what we would call common sense. That is the view they took. How could Jesus avoid being touched and jostled in a crowd like that. It is like someone asking "Who touched me?" in a rugby scrum!</u>

We so often fail to recognise what others are going through. Because we have no experience of something, it is easy to forget that something is costly to someone else. Some time ago my wife wrote a series of study books called "Put Yourself in my Shoes" Taking people from the gospel stories and trying to get behind the story and the person. They were published by Methodist Publishing House and very popular.

It tells us something about the woman 3. It tells us of the relief of confession. It was all so difficult. It was all so humiliating. But once she had told the whole truth to Jesus, the terror and the trembling were gone and a wave of relief flooded her heart. As we read about this and other healing miracles in the New Testament there is a risk that we think of it as simply history. Healing still continues to take place today in all sorts of ways mostly undramatic. But we do need to think carefully about what are described as modern miracles. It is possible to be fooled. I love the story of Dr Jan Lavric from Doncaster who had helped organise a trip to Rome for a group of disabled people. The highlight of the trip was an audience with the pope in the Vatican. By the time Dr Lavric had seen to the needs of the disabled members of the party there was just one empty seat left - a wheelchair. But no sooner had he sat down than a nun wheeled him off to be blessed by the Pope. Dr Lavric had no chance to explain. The Pope said

words of blessing then left the room. As Dr Lavric got up from his seat, there was a tremendous commotion amongst the nuns. They thought it was a miracle!

There copious literature is about remarkable modern healings and not all amongst the Pentecostal wing of the church. Here are 2 examples. The evangelist John Wimber tells of an occasion when he and a team member were called to pray for a woman whose left hand had actually died. It was black to the elbow, her fingers were drawn up and rotting. An amputation had been scheduled for the following day. He said the odour was awful and I could almost see bones through the skin of the fingers. I stood there swallowing trying to settle my queasy stomach, when suddenly I knew I had to touch that hand. I put my hands over hers and prayed. As soon as I got out of the room, I said to the team "Why on earth did I do that? I probably embarrassed her by drawing attention to her plight." We went home with no sense of having won a victory at all. I fully expected the hear the next day that the amputation had been completed. Two weeks later her brother came up to me with a lengthy letter the woman had written. It told how overnight her hand had begun to recover just enough to forestall the amputation. The doctors kept postponing it a day at a time until she was quite well again.

The other example is from the ministry of Rev David Watson a great Anglican preacher and evangelist. It concerns Susan Speight a domestic science teacher from Wetherby who, for 4yrs, had been confined to a wheelchair due to neuropathy stemming from diabetes. She had lost all feeing from the waist down. In 1977 she went to a festival in Leeds Town Hall where David Watson was the preacher. During David's talk she began to feel her feet getting hot and eventually all feeling returned. She realised that she should now be able to walk again. When the meeting was over, she called to one of the team members and told him what had happened. He helped her out of her wheelchair and together they walked round the outside of the town hall without using sticks. Realising that she could now walk again they went back inside to tell David (who knew nothing about it). They then spent time praising God for his unexpected healing power.

#### Conclusion

We see that there is a connection between our faith and Jesus' power. Faith, though itself powerless, is the channel through which Jesus' power can work. He is not a magician doing conjuring tricks by some secret power for an amazed and uninvolved audience. He is God's Son the one who is remaking us. Mark highlights in this story the intimate nature of the contact between the individual and Jesus. When life crowds in with all its pressures there is still room for us to creep up behind Jesus – if that is all we can feel we can do – and reach out to touch him and feel his healing power in our lives.
