Sermon

Congratulations. You are taking time out to worship God instead of chasing around after presents, food or cards! You obviously take the message of Christmas seriously. Today in Advent we highlight the herald of Jesus coming, John the Baptizer – a wild man of the desert, slightly scary and demanding. He appears to be bad news but is in fact the very best of news. Mark headlines John's arrival "The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Son of God". Mark names Isaiah as John's source. "Comfort ye my people". It does not mean cheer up my people, but 'Go and comfort my people. Be kind to them. Tell them that the war is over- they have suffered enough'. It is good news addressed to 'my people'.

The voice of one crying out in the wilderness "Prepare the way of the Lord"

It was Isaiah's task. It was John's task, and it is our task.

<u>Isaiah's task</u>

It was not easy for Isaiah. In a world which judged by appearances, he had to tell them to prepare for the coming of God who would judge the poor, not by their poverty, but by righteousness, who would judge between the meek and their oppressors, not by their relative strength, but with justice. At a time when the world was ruled by powerful men., he had to declare that the day would come when a little child would lead them. In that wilderness he prepared a way for the Lord.

John's Task

It was not easy for John. His message brought him into direct conflict with the religious leaders of his day. He refused to baptise them, to embrace their lifestyle, to bless their hypocrisies. In the wilderness he was preparing a way for the Lord who's coming would be to such people like fire in a corn field, driving everything hidden into light. John's message was quite simple – share what is yours with others – don't be greedy – don't use your position to exploit others – remember the basic solidarity of the human race. It was all set out in Luke's gospel. But this was a threat to the religious authorities in Jerusalem. It made them jittery. They set out to silence John. They did not want a new age to dawn.

Our Task

It is not any easier for us in the wilderness we inhabit. There are still the equivalents of John and the Sadducees and Pharisees. Today's John the Baptists bring a disturbing word, stressing the need to care for our planet, stressing the need to care for the poor, to observe human rights. Today's Johns are not always in the church. Their message is that another world is possible. Today's Sadducees & Pharisees are perfectly comfortable as they are, resentful and suspicious of those who remind them of uncomfortable truths. I suspect there is a bit of John the Baptist and a bit of the Sadducees and Pharisees in all of us. That is why we are thinking about Advent – a time to take stock to prepare for Jesus coming.

We are responsible for the areas of our life which have become a wilderness and need the presence of the Lord. What about our relationships with husband, wife, partner, children, friends and colleagues. Have any of them broken down and does the resulting anger, resentment, or bitterness create a barrier against the presence of Christ? Does it mean that his peace and joy cannot feel at home? Is there a need to prepare a way for the Lord? Is there a telephone that needs to be picked up? A visit made? A letter to be written? Flowers to be sent? A gesture of reconciliation, an offer of forgiveness to be made? It is in such practical realities that the way is prepared for the coming of the Lord

So halfway through Advent Jesus is coming. Prepare a way for him in the whole world, in the intimate world of our personal relationships, in the private world of our own being. A little child will lead us. His name is Jesus
